# Milford Area Preservation Group's Summer Newsletter 2025

#### Traffic Surveys on Manor Farm Road and on Milford Mill Road: Results

The two surveys took place in February. The reports are taken from information supplied to the MAPG by Paul Shaddock, Senior Engineer (Traffic Engineering) of Salisbury's Transportation Team

**Milford Mill Road** (MMR). The survey is being compared to that of 2021, which took place in July, arguably a period of higher-volume traffic.

The headline results are that the survey recorded a total of 26,813 vehicles using the road, an average of 3,742 vehicles per day. The average speed of vehicles was recorded to be 19.8mph with the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed of traffic recorded to be 23.6mph.

The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile figure is the speed at or below which 85% of the traffic is travelling and is the standard method of assessing traffic speed in the UK.

#### **Speeding**

Sign only 20mph speed limits (as already in place on the section of Milford Mill Road surveyed) can only be introduced where the average speed of traffic using a road is less than 24.0 mph.

The Police are responsible for enforcing speed limits and do so on the basis of the guidance provided by ACPO which recommends a threshold 10% of the limit plus 2mph. Where a road is subject to a 20mph speed limit a vehicle must therefore be travelling above 24mph to be considered as speeding.

In Wiltshire on a road subject to a 20mph speed limit the following criteria is applied:

- 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed is between 20mph and 24mph = No Further Action
- 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed is between 24.1mph and 38.9mph = Eligible for Community Speed Watch (CSW) or Deployment of Speed Indicator Device (SID)

 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed is over 39mph = Subject to Police enforcement or considered for traffic calming

The results of the survey on MMR indicate that overall, the 20mph speed limit remains appropriate and that a speeding problem is not considered to exist at the location surveyed. More generally the results paint a positive picture. The 2021 survey found the average speed of traffic to be 21.7mph with the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile speed of traffic recorded to be 26mph. A combination of the use of the SID, CSW and the presence of a number of parked vehicles appear to be controlling the speed of traffic.

#### **Volume of Traffic**

The results of the survey with respect to the volume of traffic using MMR appear to be encouraging. The survey recorded a total of 26,813 vehicles using the road, at an average of 3,742 vehicles per day. The 2021 survey recorded 36,393 vehicles using the road, at an average of 5199 per day. Thus, a significant reduction in traffic using Milford Mill Road during the past four years.

#### **HGVs**

The survey recorded that 1.3% of the overall volume of traffic using MMR to be HGVs. Again, this appears to be a positive result as HGVs represented 2.3 percent of the overall recorded volume of traffic in the 2021 survey.

Mr Shaddock made the point that just because HGVs are using MMR doesn't mean they are doing so illegally. The 7.5t weight restriction has exemptions for properties within the area to be serviced (i.e. deliveries, refuse collection etc.) which means some of the HGVs recorded will have been legitimately able to do so.


**Manor Farm Road (MFR).** This is the first traffic survey conducted on MFR and was conducted between February 20 – March 3.

41,738 vehicles were recorded as using the road in that period, at an average of 3,478 per day. 82% of vehicles exceeded the 20mph speed limit. The average speed was 24.11mph, and the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile was 28.4mph. 3% of vehicles were HGVs.

The rules and policy towards speeding vehicles are as described above.

Mr Shaddock says that for MFR: "In line with the Council's criteria the location is considered suitable for the deployment of a SID (Speed Indicator Device) or CSW (Community Speed Watch) to address the speeding issue identified in the survey." As MAPG has been unable to persuade any new volunteers to help run Speed Watch on MFR, the only option available to us is a SID. We will investigate the possibility of making the SID a permanent fixture.

As was agreed at the meeting in December between Wiltshire Highways Officers, MAPG and the three Councillors who attended, a further meeting - to include the Local Highway and Footpath Improvement Groups - will be held to discuss the results of both traffic surveys. In addition to the SID on MFR, in the light of a recent middle of the night increase in surreptitious HGV traffic, we hope the meeting will also agree to placing an ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) on MMR.

### **AGM Report**

## Meeting held on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> April 2025 at the Laverstock and Ford Village Hall

The AGM was attended by over fifty members.

#### **Key points**

The annual Milfordian has been replaced by three newsletters: winter, summer and autumn. An MAPG book, 'The Best of Milford' has been published and will be on offer to MAPG members and friends during the July subs collection (see details on page 11).

MAPG has been concerned for many years about the amount of local traffic and the condition of our roads. Members heard that in response to MAPG lobbying, Wiltshire Highways conducted traffic surveys in February on Manor Farm Road and on Milford Mill Road. The results of these surveys are on pages 1-3

Action Days have included work on the River Bourne expertly led by Andy Howard, work in Milford Hollow led by Barbara Lovibond, and a number of very successful litter picks organised by Julie Eastaugh.

The Chair praised and thanked local councillors Charles McGrath and Ian McLellan who are both retiring. Members present showed their appreciation in the usual manner.

The Constitution. Committee member Peter Hicks explained that a new constitution had been drawn up in anticipation of MAPG becoming a charity. Because this did not happen, the constitution needed to be revised. Copies of a new draft had been placed on the website and were available in hard copy at the meeting. The area covered by MAPG has been made clearer. A 'member' is now defined as all adult members of a household in the defined area.

If MAPG closes, there would be a vote at its last meeting to decide where the funds would be allocated. An MAPG member then made some excellent observations and suggestions which will be reflected in the final draft of the constitution. Acceptance of the constitution as amended was proposed by Laura Jones, seconded by Charles McGrath and voted in by a show of hands.

Treasurer's Report. The end of year balance sheet had been made available. The treasurer reminded members that our financial year now runs from January to December. The balance sheet includes a donation of £500 to the Laverstock Village Hall. The auditor, John Perry, was thanked by the treasurer for his invaluable assistance. It was reiterated that MAPG had been set up originally to protect local land from development. To do this, a 'fighting fund' will be maintained.

Acceptance of the accounts was proposed by Carol Taylor, seconded by Jo Boyers and approved by the members present by a show of hands.

#### Fundraising Report.

n the last year our trips have been to Exbury gardens, RHS Wisley, and Stourhead. The trips have been very successful, with the minibus filled each time. In November, a record 82 people attended our annual quiz night, which was a fantastic event. This year we are running a trip to Hampton Court Garden Festival in July. This outing is now fully booked. The Quiz Night will be on 22<sup>nd</sup> November – and once again we will be donating £500 to the Village Hall.

#### Speedwatch Report.

This MAPG initiative has been running for several years with varying degrees of success. In the last year, there has been a reduction in the speed of traffic due to parked cars on Milford Mill Road. The number of vehicles reported to the police has decreased slightly. Offenders receive a letter from the police, and those travelling at 30 mph and over have a police visit. Penny Perry and Jenny May were thanked for their hard work and dedication in conducting speedwatch on a weekly basis. We will review whether it is worth continuing with the project as it is a huge time commitment and is not necessarily efficacious.

#### The Website and Milford Hollow.

Members were encouraged to visit the website www.milfordpreservationgroup.com . As mentioned at the last AGM, Godolphin/United Learning own Milford Hollow and have continued to be supportive of our work. MAPG took part in their 'Volunteer Day' in July 2024 supervising a group of girls gardening in the Hollow, and then litter picking later in the day. In January, Godolphin's groundsman was quick to act when a tree was discovered to be leaning dangerously over the path. Within less than 24-hours it was felled and the area cleared. MAPG has planted a crab apple tree in its place. There was an action day of weeding and planting in March and volunteers were thanked for their hard work. Cecilia Marshall was particularly thanked for her donations of plants and gardening expertise.

#### **Election of Officers**

The Chair emphasised the point that all members of the committee had working roles. He thanked all members individually for their hard work and dedication. Two members of the committee have left this year, and Charles McGrath no longer wishes to stand. There are therefore vacancies and members present were encouraged to let the committee know if they are interested in joining. All current members of the committee are willing to stand again. Re-election was proposed by Peter Hicks, seconded by Laura Jones and voted in by a show of hands.

#### AOB

Members were warned about the rapid growth of hemlock in the area and the dangers that this poisonous plant presents.

#### The Guest Speaker.

Dr Phil Harding of Time Watch and of Wessex Archaeology was introduced and presented a fascinating talk about the archaeology of Milford Hill.



Unfortunately, we were unable to persuade any new volunteers to supplement our work on MMR or to extend it to include Manor Farm Road.


Also, the regular parking of several cars on MMR has had the effect of slowing traffic and making our efforts increasingly otiose.

## Developer's Plan for Nearly 50 Houses on Church Road: Latest News

The Wiltshire Council planning committee had said the proposal "constitutes unsuitable development in the open countryside." It is also contrary to the Laverstock and Ford Neighbourhood Plan, which identifies Laverstock as a "small village where development is limited to infill".

However, Cllr Nick Baker tells us: "I fear that we will soon have disappointing news from the planning inspectorate. I will continue to fight this as long as possible, but the previous Conservative administration's decision not to instruct a barrister to defend their own strategic Planning committee leaves us in a weak position. I will be investigating whether this decision can be reviewed in light of the changed administration, but the process may have moved on too far for that."
